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# FIRST FAVORITES COMPREHENSION GUIDE How to Use this Guide

What is *First Favorites?* It is a collection of literature guides to assist beginning readers to enjoy and comprehend a book. Once children learn how to decode words they need to learn how to engage the materials. They need to learn how to comprehend what they are reading. So how do we do this?

The books may be read in any order, but we have placed them in order based on difficulty. Generally, we spend three to four days per book. With chapter books such as *Frog and Toad are Friends* you may need five to seven days. Children generally will read the book twice during this time. They should be reading the books aloud with you. You should help them to decode unfamiliar words. Be sure to let children sound out the words, rather than just giving them the pronunciation. Teach them to read with expression, which includes following the punctuation.

The comprehension questions and activities are there to help children focus on particular portions of the text and to help you assess their understanding of it. The children should be allowed to refer back to the text if needed. Although the answers in the guide are provided in incomplete sentences, you should expect the student to answer in complete sentences.

#### Example:

Question: What did Mr. Putter eat in the mornings?

Answer: Mr. Putter ate English muffins.

The art activities are meant to bring the text alive. Children always retain more when they work with the material. Handwriting exercises will provide students practice sentences to rehearse manuscript writing.







### Pancakes for Nate

# Ingredients

2 cups buttermilk (add more as required for proper consistency)
2 eggs, not beaten
2 tablespoons melted butter
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1-1/4 cups unbleached flour
1-1/2 teaspoons of baking powder
Optional: sliced banana, chopped pecans, chocolate chips, or blueberries



#### **Directions**

Stir together buttermilk, eggs, and butter. Sift together flour, baking powder, baking soda, sugar and salt. Combine all ingredients. Stir gently, then ladle onto a pre-heated, buttered frying pan. When pancake begins to bubble you may want to add optional ingredients before flipping. Turn when golden brown. Cook other side to golden brown also. Serve with heated maple syrup. Makes: 12 to 14 pancakes.


